

May the 16<sup>th</sup> 1829 Choctaw

To Andrew Jackson president of the United States  
Dear friend and Brother as I consider it my Duty  
to write <sup>to you</sup> my best respects to you and Inform you  
how myself and the people of my Nation generally  
are gratified on hearing of your Elevation to the  
I am the man that has ever been willing to Do  
any thing that was reasonable and in the bounds  
of my power when I was acting chief in my Nation  
to dissillitate your views or the views of your Gover  
ment when I was acting chief we made a treaty  
in the year of 1820 at Doaks Stand wherein there  
was a stipulation saying that I should receive  
annually from the Government of the United  
States one hundred and fifty Dollars During my  
natural life which I have regularly rec<sup>d</sup> ever  
since but now I understand I am not to be  
ceive any more and that it is to be paid  
to the Acting Chief of the District I think his  
taking my office from me Dont give <sup>him</sup> any claim  
to my money I have ever respected you as a brother  
we have been together in war and peace &  
when you was Engaged in war with the  
Creek Indians I was always subject to your

order and willing to aid and assist you we  
were together in Washington City in 1824 where  
we were very friendly therefore my Dependance is  
on you to see that I get my Right one ~~hundred~~  
hundred and fifty Dollars is not much to a  
man that has plenty but a great Deal to one  
that has but little therefore I contend for my  
money that I know I ought to have I wish  
you to answer me as quick as convenient  
I am with Respect your most obedient  
Servt.
